



WEEKLY REFLECTION BY FR. MANO

I think I forgot to tell you all that I will be going home to visit my family after Christmas. Yes, I went home in May for my nephew's wedding, so I thought I didn't have to go home this winter. But my mom insists that I should come home. I may not be obedient to my Bishop in India, but I am always obedient to my parents. So, I will be leaving right after Christmas and planning to come back at the end of January. May I request your prayers for my travel and for my family. I haven't started my shopping though. My nieces won't be happy if I don't go shopping.

One of the most common & natural styles of engaging in a conversation with a stranger is getting to 'know more' about the person. It includes getting to know their name, occupations, and their interests and likings. Some Priests and Levites came to John the Baptist to ask, "Who are you?" John the Baptist was quite clear and convinced of the answer to this question. He admitted that he was not the Messiah. He admitted that he was not Elijah. He admitted that he was not the Prophet. He testified that he was the voice crying in the desert. He testified that the One coming after him was ranking ahead of him. A deep conviction of 'who he was' guided all the actions of John the Baptist.

Do we possess such kind of a deep and anchored conviction in our Christian Life? Life often throws this question to us — Who are you? When we face emotional crises in our relationships and social interactions, we are encountered with this question, deep within us. When things in life do not go the way we wished or expected and somehow the future appears bleak, we are encountered with this question, deep within us. Failing to find an answer to this question can sometimes plunge us into a deep struggle, make us fear life and people, and crush our hopes and aspirations.

Yes, life will at many times, throw this question at us. St. John the Baptist challenges us not to get disturbed when we are faced with this provoking question in life. Our faith, hope, courage, and strength ought to be Jesus. We ought to say that 'I am God's Child' and in this is my true identity. I am the witness to the True Light and in this is my true role in life. I am a Voice in the wilderness and in this is my Christian duty and obligation.

With St. Paul, let us also exult, as he exhorts us: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the Spirit!" (1 Thess 5:16-19)





The Eucharistic miracle of Daroca was verified shortly before one of the numerous battles sustained by the Spanish against the Moors. The Christian commanders asked the priest in the field to celebrate Mass, but a few minutes after the consecration, an improvised enemy attack obliged the priest to suspend the Mass and hide the consecrated Hosts amid the lines of the celebration. The Spanish left the battle victorious and the commanders asked the priest to communicate the Hosts previously consecrated. However, they were found completely covered in Blood. Even today, it is possible to venerate the blood-stained linens.















